

Community Supervision

What is Community Supervision "Parole"?

Community Supervision (Parole) is the second part of a prison sentence. Parole starts after release, before the sentence officially ends.

Community Supervision

Community Supervision is a part of a felony sentence and is served after prison release. **Release conditions** are in place to support the person and protect the community.

Re-entry

Re-entry programs provide services to individuals who are "re-entering" the community after being released from state prison or county jail. Services typically consist of rehabilitation, education, housing, employment and medical programs.

Conditions of Release

Community Corrections Team gives a list of conditions upon release that must be met by the individual to avoid going back to prison.

Conditions often include obeying laws, avoiding drugs or alcohol, travel restrictions, and not moving residence without permission.

Individual is required to report in regularly with Community Corrections Officer (*P.O.*), regular home visits and report changes of living situation or work.

Re-entry programs may be offered to individuals being released.

What is Probation?

Probation: is a sentence or part of a sentence that requires the convicted person be supervised.

Types of Probation

Unsupervised Probation

Officer meets with the person upon sentencing. Officer will continue to monitor by telephone, email and mail with the person.

Standard Probation

Officer conducts field and office visits. Person may be enrolled in community programs. Drug use prohibited and monitored. Supervision level is tied to the person's success.

Intensive Probation

Officer monitor the person by conducting frequent field visits to residences, their jobs, etc. A person who successfully completes this program then graduates to Standard Probation.

Probation Conditions

Conditions are agreements between people and the court. Conditions can require the following examples of the person:

- Must obey all laws and report to Adult Probation Department (APD) as directed.
- Must provide APD access to your residence and get approval to change residence.
- Submit to warrantless cell phone searches
- Actively participate in drug testing and any treatment program required.
- Must be working or going to school.
- Must pay APD fees, restitution and fines on time.
- Jail term up to a year may be imposed as a condition.
- Community service.
- Any other special requirements ordered by the court.
